Description:

Equator Initiative, the GEF- Small Grants Programme (SGP), the Convention of Biological Diversity, and partners, will host the "Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities (IPLCs) Day" at the Rio Conventions Pavilion. The day will consist of a series of dialogues and panel discussions to share knowledge, exchange best practices, inform policy, and enhance capacity. Topics addressed will mirror the main themes of COP 13--forests, fisheries, agriculture and tourism--while focusing on local solutions for the protection and sustainable use of biological resources. The evening reception will be the first event in a series of celebrations to mark the 15th anniversary of the Equator Initiative and the 25th anniversary of the GEF-Small Grants Programme.

Indigenous peoples and local communities are among the best managers of the world's biodiversity and ecosystems, and are indispensable partners in sustainable development. Whether it is forests, marine ecosystems, agricultural landscapes or wildlife corridors, it is often at the local level where win-win solutions for people and nature are forged. When empowered to manage their biodiversity and ecosystems, indigenous peoples and community-based organizations are capable of delivering benefits well beyond environment and conservation, including in health, education, energy and water access, food security, conflict resolution, disaster recovery and more: in other words, they can deliver the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the Convention on Biological Diversity's Aichi targets.

OBJECTIVES

- 1) Showcase indigenous and local community (IPLCs) voices and perspectives, and serve as an effective bridge connecting policy makers, academics, private sector, civil society and the media with on-the-ground practitioners.
- 2) Facilitate the full and effective participation of IPLCs in biodiversity conservation, and showcase their contributions to achieving the Aichi Targets and the SDGs.

- 3) Shed light on the role of IPLCs as indispensable partners for sustainable forest management and wildlife conservation, and discuss how investing in their rights, entitlements, and empowerment will ensure a sustainable future for all.
- 4) Explore how communities are responding to challenges to safeguard marine resources, share local best practices from locally managed marine protected areas, and discuss how these initiatives can be scaled up and replicated.
- 5) Deliberate over best sustainable agricultural practices for resilience, discuss effective land tenure policies and examine the role of indigenous and local knowledge in preserving biodiversity for human development.
- 6) Share examples of local best practice in the tourism industry, and showcase successful partnerships between local communities, governments, the private sector, and others that can help localize the SDGs, as well as examples of legal frameworks and decision-making processes affecting the tourism industry today.
- 7) Celebrate 15 years of the Equator Initiative and 25 years of the GEF-Small Grants Progamme
